1. Promoting Brighton as a great place to be

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Complete streetscape projects in Brighton on the Midland Highway and Elderslie Road
- Undertake a public relations campaign in the *Brighton Community News*, LGAT Magazine and the Tasmanian Business Reporter
- Complete the Bridgewater Urban Renewal Project

2. Improving land use planning

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Rezone land in accordance with the recommendations of the Brighton Structure Plan
- Develop a Bridgewater Local Area Structure Plan
- Implement the Bridgewater Local Area Structure Plan into the Brighton Planning Scheme

3. Maintaining and improving the physical infrastructure of the region

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Reconstruction works in Crooked Billet Drive and Briggs Road
- Safety improvements in Gunners Quoin Road
- Kerb and channel improvements in Augustus Street
- Stormwater works in Cartwright Street, Stonefield Road and at the Brighton race track
- Oval improvements at Pontville Park
- Continue the Greening Brighton/Landscaping Project
- Upgrade council's asset management systems

4. Promoting industrial and business growth

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Support continued Greenpoint redevelopment
- Implement land use rezoning and urban planning for commercial and industrial growth and competition
- Engage with business and commercial organisations

5. Forming alliances to take projects and strategies forward

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Further plan and develop the provision of Brighton Council professional services in Tasmania, the mainland and overseas
- Explore/develop a strategy(s) to ensure appropriate government assistance and ongoing input of resources
- Explore/develop strategy(s) to ensure appropriate assistance and ongoing input of resources from corporate and non-profit organizations

6. Improving communication and interaction between residents, community groups and businesses

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Update council's sport and recreational plan
- Support the Brighton Alive website upgrade and administration
- Improve waste collection services by providing residents with new recycling wheelie bins at no additional cost

7. Improving education and training opportunities

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Continue to work closely with the Commonwealth and State Governments, the Bridgewater and Southern Midlands Learning Federation and the LINC project in developing further education facilities at Bridgewater

8. Ensuring the provision of improved transport systems

2010-2011 initiatives:

- Construct 4000m Gagebrook foreshore walkway
- Concrete extension to the Jordan River walkway
- Construct new footpaths in Elderslie Road, Sorell Street, Munday Street, Cobbs Hill Road and Gagebrook

Public Health

Council will:

- Conduct monthly immunisation clinics, annual school immunisations and promote the need for immunisation.
- Ensure proper provision of on-site effluent disposal in compliance with relevant standards.
- Undertake routine inspection of places of public assembly, food premises, public health risk activities and water carters to ensure compliance with relevant legislation.
- Promptly investigate environmental health complaints.
- Maintain an effective analysis program for food, recreational waters and general complaints.

Risk Management

Council will:

- Continue to keep risk exposure to a minimum by helping reduce injuries and potential loss. Management practices will involve identifying risks, analysing and treating by taking appropriate action.
- Continue to be proactive in inspections and reviews of roads, footpaths, written agreements with clubs/user groups, building & financial services, town planning and recreation functions.
- Educate community groups on importance and activities involved with risk management.
