To recycle your plastic you need to know:

- · Not all plastic packaging displays the recycling triangle (officially known as the Plastic Identification Code). This triangle tells you what plastic was used to make the packaging, not whether the packaging is recyclable.
- Plastic can be placed into two categories:

1. Hard Plastic

Any plastic that is rigid or holds its shape, for example shampoo bottles, can be recycled through your kerbside recycling bin.



2. Soft Plastic

Plastic that is flexible, for example, bread bags,

bubble wrap and plastic bags, cannot be recycled in any Tasmanian kerbside recycling collection. Most major supermarkets now accept clean, flexible plastics

for recycling. Some transfer stations accept soft plastic.
